

WRI provides some food, formula, and implements used in feeding mammals, reptiles, birds and fawns. To receive supplies, the rehabilitator must be a member in good standing and take on-call at least one 6 hour shift per month throughout the year. Contact Jean Alfano at 336.701.9556.

WRI Public Education programs begin in April. Each year, from April through November, Wildlife Rehab Inc. volunteers hit the road to tell of the efforts of wildlife rehabilitators in our area. We bring along our live educational ambassadors: hawks, owls, vultures, and snakes to help attract a crowd.



The first education program is the **Spring Festival**, **Saturday**, **April 7**th **at Historic Bethabara Park**. This is an on-going annual event sponsored by the City of Winston-Salem Parks & Recs department. 11AM to 3PM

Next is the annual **Earth Day Fair on Saturday**, **April 21**st at the Winston-Salem Fairgrounds. The organizer, Piedmont Environmental Alliance (PEA), began in 2005 as a group of friends interested in promoting an environmentally sustainable community. This is now a huge event with up to 8,000 people expected this year. The WRI tent always attracts large crowds all day long. 10AM to 4PM
